A thousand people 'Helping hands for



Our campaign to save the viaduct at Falling Sands is gathering pace, as people sign up to add a name to the SVR's first ever donation wall.

People are adding their own name, or that of a friend or family member, even a cherished family pet. Others are adding the name of a loved one in memory. Shops and businesses can add their name too, and are receiving acknowledgement and promotion on the SVR's social media channels.

Charitable Trust director Shelagh Paterson explains the donation wall's importance: "It's part of our campaign to raise £275,000 of match funding, to help unlock £1 million from the

Heritage Lottery Fund. With this money in place, we'll be able to carry out essential repairs to Falling Sands Viaduct. At the same time, the restoration project will act as a springboard to open up the world of railway engineering to our local community, schools and visitors.

"HLF are already supporting us with a development grant of almost £72,000, and we'll be submitting our final bid for £1 million to them in autumn 2018."

We have a sneaking feeling that quite a few people might not know where the viaduct at Falling Sands is, let alone how crucial a part of the SVR jigsaw it is.

The impressive seven-arched structure lies about a mile south-west of our Kidderminster station. It's next to the new Silverwoods residential and business developments, and you can see it from the newly built Hoobrook Link Road. It's been carrying trains into the Severn Valley for more than 140 years but, as the Charitable Trust's chairman Hugh McQuade explains, it's now in urgent need of repair:

"Over the years, water has seeped down into the structure, and its corrosive effect on the brickwork is now very evident. There is already a speed restriction across the viaduct, and we may have to shorten our trains, or eventually face temporary or permanent closure of this part of our line, unless we tackle the problems now.

"With your support, and HLF funding made possible by National Lottery players, we will save Falling Sands Viaduct. We'll keep heritage trains running along the whole of our 16-mile line, into the next century, and beyond."

Flash appeal raises £13,000 for vandalised carriages

On Boxing Day 2017, the whole of the SVR was reeling. Vandals had ruined two of our beautiful heritage carriages, by spraying paint along their sides.

However, as staff began the long, hard task of removing the paint by hand, and re-applying gold leaf and painted lining to the teak-bodied GNR 2701, the smiles were coming back.

Word of the setback was getting out, through extensive TV, radio and press coverage, and frequent posts on social media. A flood of donations was arriving at the Charitable Trust office, as our director Shelagh Paterson explains:

"The response was so generous that

in just one week, we'd raised not only the £10,000 we needed, but an extra £3,000 towards other carriage restorations.

"Many, many thanks to everyone who pitched in to help. Of course, carriage restoration is like painting the Forth Road Bridge, and there's always another waiting in line! For example, plans are being made to improve another teak carriage, LNER 43612, later this year, and we're looking for sponsorship for new tables and authentic LNER-style wall lamps."

Transforming the SVR's accessibility

There's excitement in the air at the Kidderminster Carriage & Wagon works, with swift progress being made on transforming carriage 80776

into first class dining accommodation for wheelchair users and their companions.

It will have an innovative zigzag table layout, to accommodate a flexible number of wheelchair users and their companions. Our craftsman are taking enormous care to get the dimensions of the tables just right.

The dining car is part of a larger accessibility project, helped by funding from the Department for Transport.

Although trains only stop at Eardington on high days and holidays, this little country station has a robust band of supporters. Now, with financial support from both the Charitable Trust and the SVR Guarantee Board, the Friends of Eardington Station have restored the platform to an authentic and much improved condition, as stationmaster Steve Downs explains.

"In 1984 half of the platform was deemed to be out of gauge and was dismantled. A sloping face supported by concrete sleepers was installed - not really a great commitment to heritage"

The volunteer-led transformation involved taking out the unloved sloping face, putting in foundations and building up the platform with 6,000 donated GWR bricks.



Permanent way improvements

The Charitable Trust has once again contributed to essential work on the permanent way.

At County Boundary, 240 feet of track was stabilised, by replacing the upper layer of ballast and re-laying the track on top. This was the final part of the huge remedial project that took place over many months last year, following a serious landslip.

There was also a good deal of activity on both sides of the Bewdley tunnel; ballast was replaced in the cutting on the Kidderminster side, and on the Bewdley side the ballast was cleaned along a half-mile stretch. Meanwhile in Kidderminster, a volunteer team carried out improvements to the track in the carriage shed yard.

Tackling the rot in GWR dining car

At Bewdley, carriage & wagon staff are undertaking a Charitable Trustfunded labour of love to restore our GWR kitchen dining car, 9615.

It's been a painstaking process to replace rotten timbers and framework. To keep the roof supported, the team could only remove one section at a time. This time-consuming and tricky job meant using the removed rotten section as a template for the new replacement. However, it's all in a day's work for our skilled restorers, who will move on to repair the roof and metal skin, as well as refitting the glass in the windows and rebuilding the doors.

The next stage will be to design and procure a kitchen that not only looks authentic, but also meets current health regulations.



Hinton Manor returning to the SVR

In 2018 we will be welcoming back a much-missed friend, as locomotive 7819 Hinton Manor returns to the SVR. Owned by the Charitable Trust, Hinton Manor has been on display at a shopping complex in Swindon for the last 10 years.

Hinton Manor will be on static display at The Engine House Visitor Centre, Highley.



The Toad becomes a 'prince'

As soon as volunteers at the LNER Carriage Group in Bewdley had completed their restoration work on the Charitable Trust's GWR Toad Brake Van No 17410, the wagon moved to Kidderminster Carriage & Wagon.

Volunteer project leader Richard Gunning explains, "After a professional brake overhaul, and wheel re-profiling, the restored Toad should make its debut at the Goods Gala in June 2018. It will go on to earn money for the Railway, providing brake van rides at special events, and taking part in film work."

No stranger to the cameras, this vehicle appeared in the 1980s BBC children's series God's Wonderful Railway, now available on DVD from SVR shops.

This is the biggest redevelopment project in the SVR's history, and as we go to press, work on the GWR-style refreshment room is moving closer to completion. The next phase of the project will include the installation of a restored turntable at

Bridgnorth, improved car parking and improvements to the Grade II listed station building.

Heritage engineers of the future



The SVR's Heritage Skills Training Academy marked an exciting milestone in 2017 with the graduation of its first apprentice engineer. Max Green is now an improver fitter-machinist in the locomotive workshop at Bridgnorth. Four more apprentices will also finish their training later this year and are hopeful of future SVR employment.

In August 2018, two new entrants will begin their Academy apprenticeships at the Railway, after beating off competition from hundreds of other applicants.

It costs £21,000 a year to train each one of our apprentices, and the training lasts between two and four years, depending on the level of qualification.

The Charitable Trust continues to be the majority funder of the Academy, and has secured contributions from a number of grant-making organisations (see page 21), and businesses. Mortons, the publisher of Heritage Railway and The Railway Magazine, is currently



sponsoring an apprentice. If your company would like to get involved, please let us know.

You may be aware of the new General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) that recently came into force. Although the SVR Charitable Trust has


